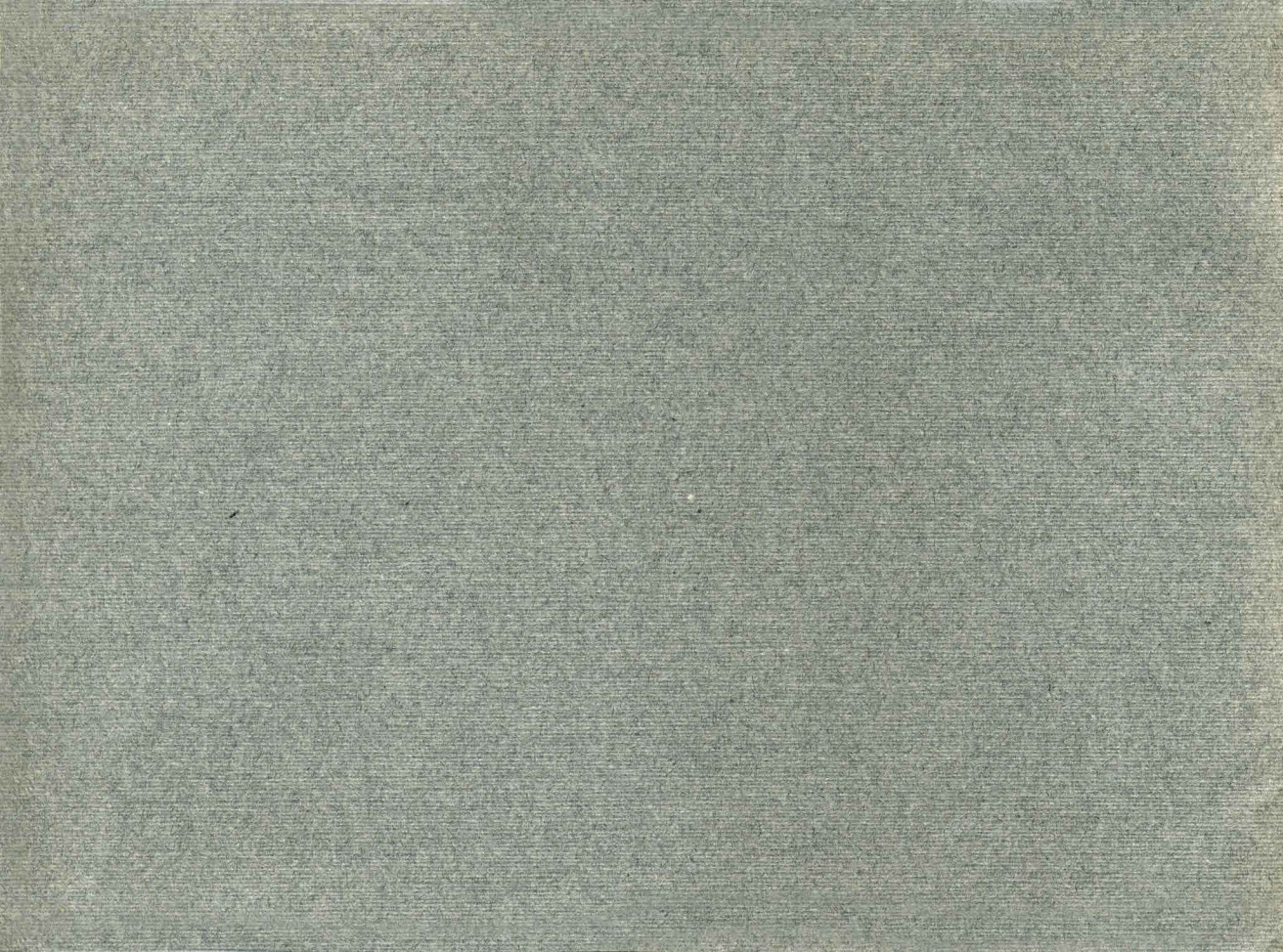

IDYLEASE INN is a modern health resort open throughout the year.

It is beautifully situated at Newfoundland, among the hills of Northern New Jersey, on an elevation one thousand feet above the sea, and two hundred feet above the surrounding country.

The INN was opened, complete in all departments, January 1, 1904, and affords a finely appointed and well kept resort for those seeking rest, recreation and change of environment. It was also designed to contribute to the comfort and health of convalescents, neurasthenics, cases of nervous exhaustion, or of those needing special dietary attention. Its purpose is similar to that of institutions in Germany, known as "Nature Cures," in which wholesome food, regular hours, rest, open air exercise and scientifically administered baths and massage restore the vigor and strength of those whose health has been impaired by disease or by physical or nervous strain.

The widest usefulness of the INN to those it is intended to benefit forbids anything suggestive of an hospital atmosphere, and requires the exclusion of incurables, consumptives, mental cases, alcoholics and drug habitues.

In a large portion the natural ruggedness and beauty have been preserved.



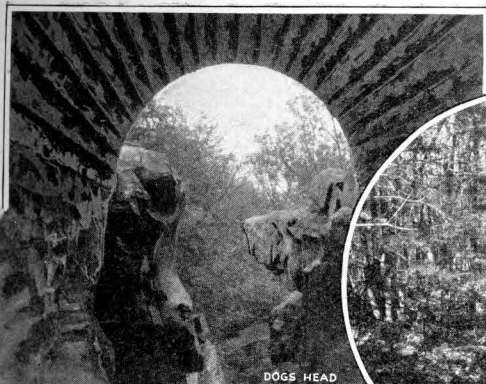
THE GROVE

The grounds consist of about fifty acres of lawn and woodland. Portions of the latter have been transformed into delightful groves threaded with paths.

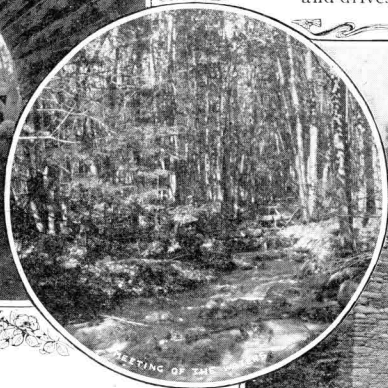


THE WOODS

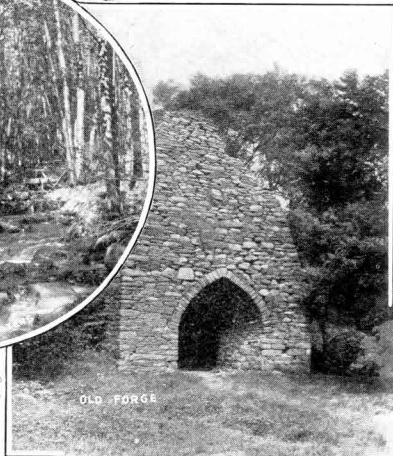
The hills, beautiful woods, streams and lakes in our vicinity lend charm to our scenery and afford objective points for many interesting walks and drives.

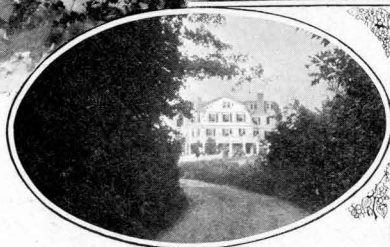
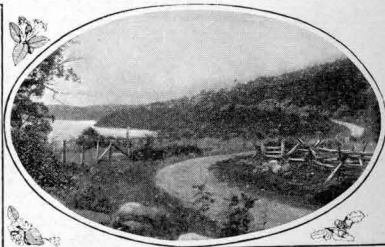

In winter our mountain air is dry, and low temperatures exhilarate rather than chill.

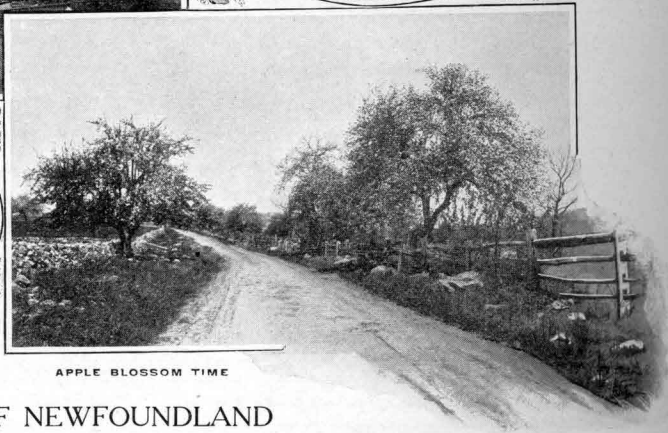
GREENWOOD LAKE

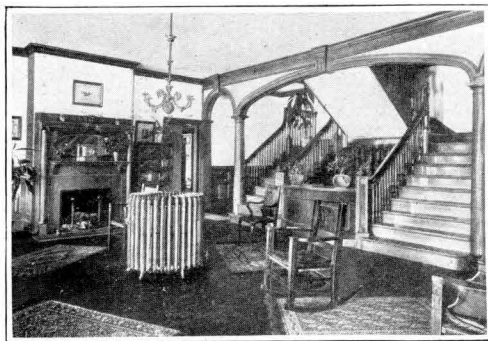


APPLE BLOSSOM TIME

N the construction of the INN neither expense nor effort was spared to render all its appointments sanitary and attractive in accord with the modern demand for elegance and comfort. It was built with special care to meet the requirements of winter. An excellent heating plant has proved it possible to maintain a comfortable temperature in all the rooms in the severest weather.

A broad piazza extends along three sides of the building, affording an enjoyable resting place in summer, and a fine promenade in winter. The views from the porch and windows of the house are in all directions varied and beautiful. Gorgeous sunsets and lingering twilights, unmarred by the presence of mosquitoes, render the summer evenings delightful.



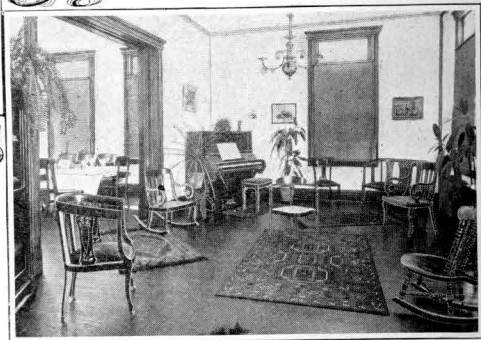
RECEPTION HALL

The rooms are light and airy, the bed rooms tastefully and substantially furnished, the beds supplied with easy box springs, and the best grade of hair mattresses obtainable. Ample bathing facilities are provided. All open plumbing is used, and the drainage system is the best that can be devised.

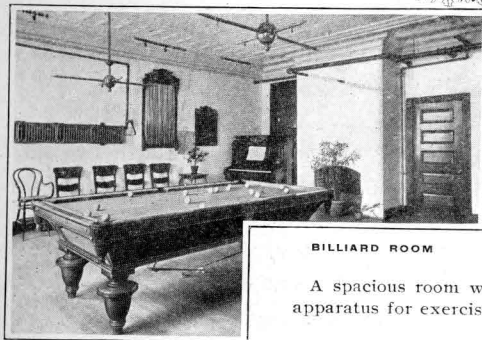
As one enters the reception hall the first impression is pleasing and homelike, and is one which obtains throughout the building.

The INN is finished in hard wood only. The floors are provided with rugs, no carpets being used.

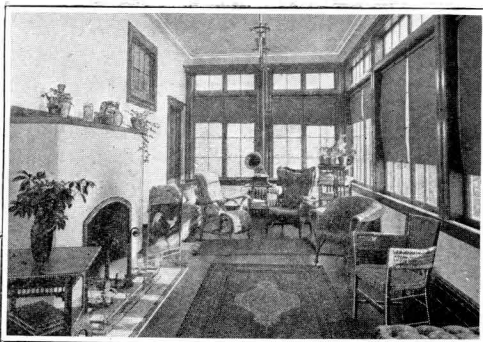
PARLOR, SHOWING CORNER OF DINING ROOM



A pleasing and important feature of the INN is the sun parlor, a large room, cozily furnished, into which the sun streams during the entire day.



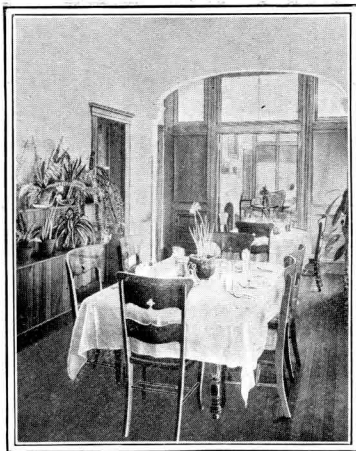
BILLIARD ROOM

Due attention has been given to indoor recreation and exercise. A billiard room, suitably equipped offers an ideal retreat for the men.

A spacious room was reserved for the gymnasium. Here will be found apparatus for exercise and muscular development.

Every attention is given to the cuisine; the food is varied, appetizing and bountiful; a large garden on the grounds supplying fresh vegetables in season.

A diet cook meets the needs of those requiring special dietary attention. Every effort will be made to fulfill to the letter instructions given by physicians regarding diet.

Our water supply cannot be surpassed. It is derived from an artesian well three hundred fifty feet deep, which yields at least three thousand gallons an hour of pure soft water. At a depth of two hundred thirteen feet a steel casing is driven firmly into the solid rock, thus absolutely preventing the possibility of contamination.

Efficient fire protection is afforded through fire retarding construction, a stand pipe, with numerous hose attachments, and chemical extinguishers.



CONSERVATORY

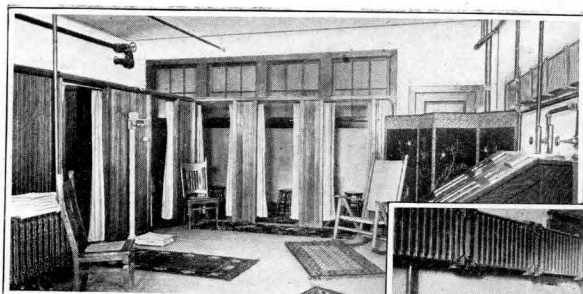
Out-door sports, including tennis and croquet are provided for.

The attractiveness of floral decoration is recognized. The conservatory in winter and the gardens in summer furnish the tables and rooms with a constant variety of flowers and plants.

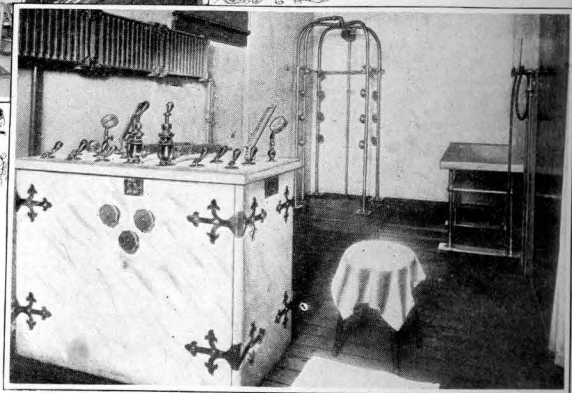


A library of carefully selected books is available for the use of the guests.

HYDROTHERAPEUTIC APPARATUS



YDROTHERAPY is now so universally endorsed by the medical profession, and its value so well known to the laity that it is, perhaps, unnecessary to speak of the advantages afforded by the Hydriatric Department. The bathing apparatus is that designed by Dr. Simon Baruch, and includes all the modern and approved hydriatric appliances. Competent and experienced attendants for men and women administer the treatments, including sprays, packs, salt rubs, drip sheets, the Nauheim baths and massage. Results in this department have already surpassed our expectation.

EWFOUNDLAND is situated on the New York, Susquehanna and Western Railroad, forty-six miles from New York City. The trains use the Pennsylvania Railroad Station in Jersey City, with Ferry connection at Cortlandt, Desbrosses and Twenty-third Streets, in New York, and Fulton Street, in Brooklyn. Time tables will be supplied when desired.

A livery service is maintained in connection with the INN for the convenience of those desiring to avail themselves of the many beautiful drives. Our carriages will meet any train desired.

Telegraph, Post Office and Railroad Station are within one mile of the INN.

Excellent roads connecting Newfoundland with Paterson, Newark, Jersey City and New York afford unexcelled opportunities for automobile touring.

OUR RATE, including room and board, for one person, varies from twelve to twenty dollars per week, depending on the location of the room ; for two in a room, twelve to eighteen dollars per week each. When meals are served in the room, and for extra service a moderate additional charge is made.

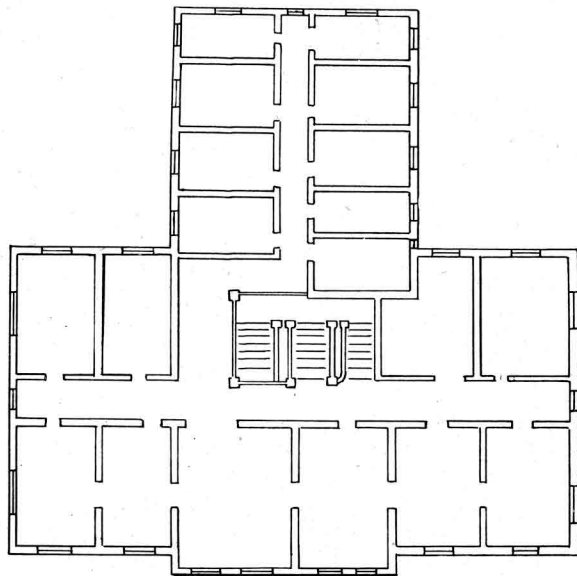
The examination fee for those taking hydriatric treatment is three dollars. Hydriatric treatments are one dollar each, or five dollars per week.

This department is not open on Sundays.

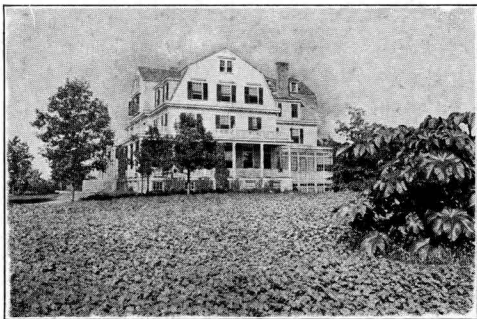
Medical attendance in rooms, and to those not taking hydriatric treatment is from one to two dollars. No charge is made for office consultation to those taking treatment.

Transportation of guests and trunks to and from the depot is twenty-five cents each.
